


Mersey Valley Way: Defra Demonstration River Walk

Newsletter – March 2026

Funded by Defra, the Mersey Valley Way is part of the government's ambition to deliver 9 river walks in each region of England by 2030 to engage more people with their local river environment for health, recreation and well-being.

Delivery commenced in October 2025 and includes path upgrades along the Stockport section of the walk and nature recovery work along the whole river valley. New interpretation assets, wayfinding and benches are being installed. Walking guides, a refreshed Mersey Paddle Trail and online digital information are also being provided. Much of the work has been completed, supported by volunteers. The remaining work is underway, ready for a formal launch of the Mersey Valley Way on 21 May.

Welcome to Stenner Woods

The Mersey Valley snakes through the south of Greater Manchester, with meadows, woodlands and wetlands flanking its river banks.

Stenner Woods Wildlife

Stenner Woods is an area of wet woodland including willow scrub. With the embankment and control of flows such as the Mersey, natural action can be described as a rare habitat. The area of Stenner Woods is a designated site of Biological Importance due to its priority wet woodland status.

Without access to wet soils, the brown fungus dieback can be seen parcelling woodland edges and along low-lying riverbanks.

Please help to be respectful as we do not disturb the wildlife. Please do not feed the wildlife. Please do not drink on the woodland floor because it is an important habitat for the water vole.

- More guided walks along the Mersey Valley Way, both short and longer walks
- Public engagement events along the river to promote the Mersey Valley Way during spring and summer 2026
- Litter pick events for the public and voluntary groups
- Free River Mersey visits for local schools and youth groups
- New Mersey Paddle Trail signage, access improvements and guide (with Paddle UK)
- Formal launch of the Mersey Valley Way: 21 May 2026
- Mid-summers day walk of the full Mersey Valley Way from Stockport to Ashton-on-Mersey
